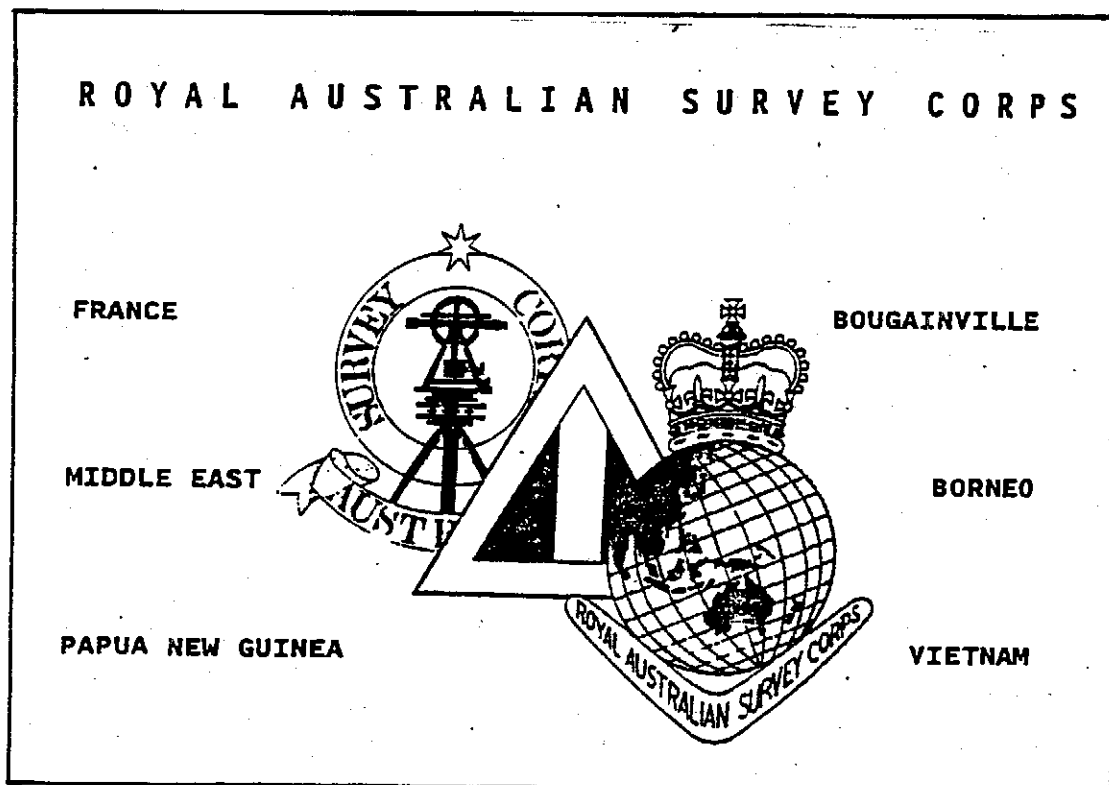

## 2 TOPO SVY TP (GRES)

The Pilbara Region was the venue for this years annual Camp and although 'Pilbara Prospect' was the name given to the Exercise there wasn't much time for prospecting.

A large amount of data needed to be collected for the Vital Asset Protection (VAP) mapping programme in WA including field verification of two 1:50 000 maps, gathering Terrain Analyses Data (MGI) and infrastructure relating to airports, townsites, port facilities and light industrial areas. The work had to be completed in a short time frame, hence two parties consisting of seven personnel each were despatched to the Karratha and Port Hedland townsites.

The Karratha detachment was accommodated at the Dept of Land Administration (DOLA) depot while personnel at Port Hedland were guests of the Pilbara Regiment. Our thanks go to both of the aforementioned for their hospitality.

To gather the required information within the short period meant a good deal of preparation was needed during the months prior to departure, and Troop members are to be commended in achieving this, and for their commitment over the duration of the Exercise.

Accompanying the Troop as part of Exercise Long Look were Capt Suzy Clarke and Sgt Eddy Triggs both of the Royal Engineers. Not only did they exchange ideas and information but also related interesting experiences of their units involvement in the Golf and Falklands conflicts.

Also along as an observer was Sgt Eddy Jacobs of 4 Fd Svy Sqn who was to have taken over as ARA Cadre but other circumstances have prevented him from doing so. ## **LT JOHN CULLEN**

some memories of Bendigo from Jo Mazzarol

When I was posted to Bendigo from the School of Survey on the Mornington Peninsular in the early '50s, among other things I did like mowing lawns, sanding the Ballroom floor, doing a bit of brick laying, driving the truck into Bendigo to get the lunches and driving officers about in the ute, I was fairly heavily involved with aerial photography, transferring principal points and other points controlling the runs for slotted template work.

I have never possessed stereoscopic vision. Despite this 'handicap' I was asked to find and transfer these points and the only way I could do it, once it was explained what I had to do, was to use the shadows of the trees, rocks, windmills, anything that appeared simultaneously on as many photos as I could find. The other five or six blokes working with me were using the small 3D apparatus.

Not being handicapped by having to use a mechanical aid and without realising it, I was churning through the work three times as fast as all the other fellas put together and of course some doubt was eventually expressed as to the accuracy of what I was doing so Lt Cullen told me that he had been asked to random check the photos to satisfy the complaint. He gave me to understand that he had no doubts about the accuracy because he had been using the photos for other reasons and was quite happy with the results. To a Sapper fresh from the School his friendly confidence in me was very welcome.

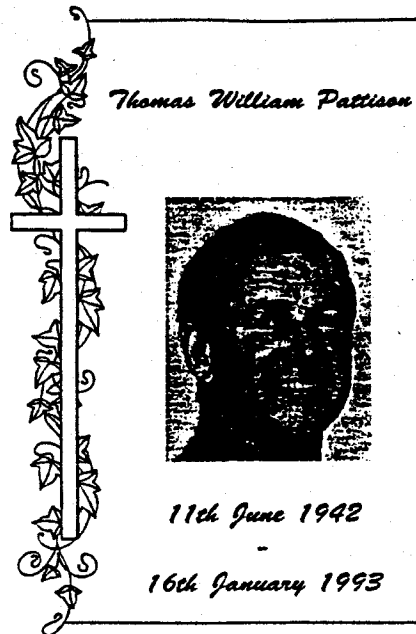
He did the checking with a stereo and found that every point checked out. The pricker I was using to transfer the points was as fine as a fairies fart so there were no 'craters' to hide in. He was very pleased to be able to report to the 'trouble makers', (probably long dead through stress and anxiety) that his team were right on the ball and well ahead of time.

I also remember his concern about my safety. I used to frequently ride a motorbike and sidecar to Adelaide of a weekend, going on leave Friday afternoon and returning Sunday night. He used to tell me to be very careful passing other vehicles at night, especially on bends and to watch for slight dips in the road that could hide an approaching car. I have never forgotten any of his advice.

In all the time I was at Bendigo I do not ever remember having seen or heard of him getting upset over anything. I have always tried to model my own life on people like that. I mean a bloke who lives to be a healthy hundred years old must be doing everything right.

## VIETNAM MEMORIAL WEEKEND

The Australian Vietnam Forces National memorial was dedicated at a ceremony at the newly erected memorial on Saturday 4th October 1992. Although the Dedication and subsequent March past was the focus, there were a number of other events which preceded and followed it which made for a most enjoyable, very long weekend.

As usual the Corps started late! By late 1991 all accommodation in Canberra had already been booked for the long weekend in October so at our ANZAC Day meeting we decided the members of Canberra RA Survey Association would billet all RASvy Vietnam Veterans wishing to come to Canberra for that weekend. All state Survey Associations were advised of this and we sat back and waited for the acceptances to roll in.

It was not the flood we expected, and hoped for, but nonetheless there were enough who did answer the call to justify the efforts the local members had made to arrange a, hopefully, enjoyable and certainly full weekend.

The proceedings started Friday night when all visitors assembled at Alex & Dawn Laing's home where they were met by their hosts and taken home for dinner. That was the theory. In practice everybody wanted to see Lloyd Patterson who travelled up from Wodonga with Ross McMillan and arrived about 9pm by which time everybody was a little chirpy and a little late for dinner.

The morning of the March dawned bright and clear. Not so many members of the RASvy contingent! Being a little "tired" from the night before most decided to forego the Dawn Service at the Australian War Memorial saving their energies for the arduous March at the Dedication Ceremony.

Members began assembling on Reid Oval, adjacent to Anzac Parade, and near to the Memorial, about 0800. With some 50,000 other Veterans also assembled there it was a time for wandering around and renewing friendships. As we marched out of Reid Park the band struck up the Corps March and again as we approached the Memorial for the 'eyes right' "Wandering the Kings Highway" greeted us. Monday, a public holiday in the ACT, saw the majority of our guests leave by bus, car, plane and train vowing we should do it again some time. Normie Rowe suggested Perth and I think that's a great idea. Count me in!

## 3rd FIELD SURVEY COMPANY DAYS

At long last I was in a position to become better acquainted with members of the section and to learn something of their good qualities, bad habits and other peculiar idiosyncracies. Those I remember with varying degrees of affection were Steve and Snow Simpson, Jack Daniels, Charlie Gilbert, George Bush, Jim Stewart, Jim Falkner (Patron of Queen's Hotel) Jack ( Sahib) Seward, Vacey Vines, Gordon Errington, Jim Anderson, Bill Bradley and Cec Mosedale. The drivers, Ray Fleay, Jack Kitchen, Jim Cahill and Ron Orwin were a pretty good bunch of young fellows. Other names which come to mind are those of that enigma, Jack Pedlar (Up North Jack-'where I come from'), Happy Harry Marriot, Snifter Phillips, Alex Weston from Victoria, Ian Growsener, whose duties I never did ascertain, Popular Boy Big Lou Pittelkow and Alan Mewburn whose backside I had the pleasure of kicking on one occasion. The tyrant of the Beacon, Capt Harry Dunne was in charge on the section, while at the other end of the line was Ernie McWhirter, a likeable old chap, officially described as the cook but sometimes described in more flowery language. There were others but their names escape me.

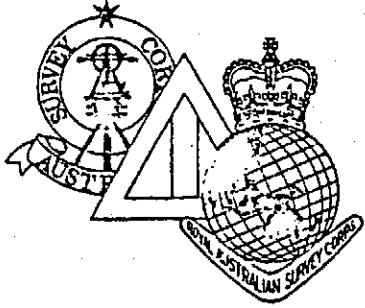
One of my pleasant memories concerns the period during which Jack Daniels, Steve Simpson and myself carried out a plane-table and contour survey of the flat-top Moresby Range a few miles inland from the coast. Out drivers were either Jack Pedlar or Ron Orwin, both of whom ably assisted when the going became a bit tough. It was a delightful experience to wander over those hills in the springtime when they were covered with wildflowers. The views of the ocean and the coastline, and of the inland farming country were superb. The mild spring days were perfect, I learned to admire Jack and Steve while we worked on the area between Mt Fairfax and White Peak. Steve created an impression of vulgar crudity on many occasions but some of the finest qualities possessed by any man became manifest while we worked on the range. Jack Daniels was always a gentleman.

One evening Steve indulged in a most enjoyable but rather devastating celebration. The resulting self-inflicted hangover was more than Steve could take. We carefully laid him in the shade of a tree and placed a water bag by his side. This was about 8.30am. A much recovered and very hungry man was picked up about 5.00pm. On another occasion we were preparing to resume work after lunch when an Army Staff car, complete with Brigadier arrived on the scene. With the aid of the plane-table sheet, Jack and Steve described the area in which we were working oblivious of the fact that the Brig. was standing on the earth covered but still hot billy fire. The antics of the Brig, and his somewhat lurid language as his boots reached an unbearably hot temperature was a delight to behold.

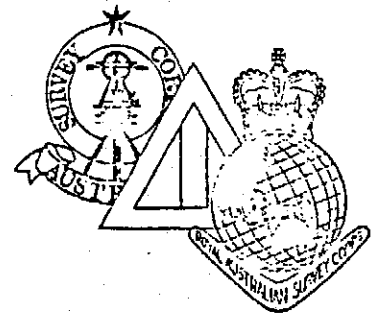
One afternoon per week was give up to sport. Teams of ten or eleven a side played Australian Rules Football on Geraldton Oval. The ground was a large one and in several instances the goalkeeper would make a dash from his end of the ground and kick a goal at the opposite end without any hinderance by the opposing team. There were a few quite good footballers in the section but there were also a few who had not played the game for many years if at all. Heavy Army boots and long trousers slowed down the game considerably. My friend Mewburn who was extremely short-sighted and of necessity wore highly magnified glasses, was shanghied into one of the teams. When his glasses fell off as they did at least six times in a match it became necessary for play to be stopped while all hands carried out a search for the lost glasses.

With others I was engaged on various trig projects in which we erected beacons, carried out clearing and showed heliographs and lights for triangulation surveys. Considerable ingenuity had to be exercised in acquiring cooking equipment and rations by the various small parties engaged on this work. Five years of batching experience in the pre-war years

proved of immense value to me in such circumstances. However Snow Simpson and I were dumped on one hill for twenty four hours without blankets or food. The Orderly Room Sergeant was highly abused on our return to camp.

It was while we were stationed in the Durlacher St. premises that our OC instituted Saturday morning inspections of quarters and equipment. One morning Jack Daniels WO1, was ordered to carry out a rifle inspection while Capt Dunne checked on the conditions of the quarters. Jack Pedlar opened the breach of his rifle to display ten cartridges in the magazine. Consternation was tempered with mercy and nothing came of the incident. One wonders what may have been the outcome if the OC had taken the parade. On a similar parade Jack Kitchen, in his hurry to get onto the parade ground fell over a fence and buried the barrel of his rifle into the earth. Jack was highly embarrassed at the uncomplimentary remarks made about the condition of his rifle. The punishment for such a misdemeanour was a run up a nearby hill wearing a gas mask. A thumb or a match box placed under the face-piece of the mask eased the strain on the lungs and so minimised the effect of the punishment.

Queens Hotel was in those days a hostelry of some-what ill repute. It has since become one of the glamour hotels of Geraldton. It became a favourite haunt of Jim Falkner for two reasons. It stocked Globe beer, a product of the town and it was within manouverable distance of our camp at closing time. One evening Jim, probably had a few over the eight and returned to camp with the impression that the litte yellow so and so's HAD LANDED ON THE BEACH. Jim staggered over the sand hills with a fixed bayonet yelling out in a mixture of Latin and genuine Australian what he was going to do to the little yellow B's. Luckily Jim very soon succumbed to Globe-itis.

Towards the end of the year, No.1 Section moved into a couple of cottages at the northern end of the town. Some mysterious organisation took over the old quarters and a queer contraption was erected on a near-by hill. We later learnt that this was a Radar Station.

About the middle of December the whole section returned to Karrakatta. Most Western Australians were granted leave over Xmas. Early in the New Year, the section was refitted and a few changes in personnel made. Isseka, a few miles south of Northhampton became the venue for the next camp. With several others I remained behind to do a course in computing for which I was duly rewarded with two stripes and a small increase in pay.

The boys were camped adjacent to the local hall which was being used as a mess room when I rejoined them. The Teakle family and other residents did much to make our stay a very pleasant one. Dances and tennis parties were organized and these proved most enjoyable.

It was about this time that Reg Dowsett joined the section. Reg had been overseas with a Railway Construction Unit but was returned to Australia on account of a deterioration in health. Reg arrived at Isseka minus half his equipment. It was located in the bar on Perth Station.

While at Issela it was the practise for the boys to go to Northhampton on Sturday nights to the pictures or to the pubs. The Falkner-Stewart combination usually chose the latter. One Saturday these two could not be found when the trucks left for camp about midnight. When the two reprobates realised their plight an argument arose as to direction of Isseka. Jim Stewart arrived back at daylight, Jim Falkner who had headed north was brought in the next afternoon on the back of a 'cocky's' truck, a much dishevelled and subdued man, very foot sore and very weary.

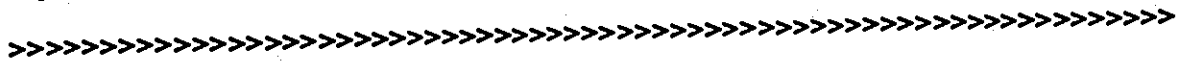
