ARMY SURVEY REGIMENT WINS CONTRACT

The Army Survey Regiment won the task of continuing to provide Topographic support to the Australian Defence Force.

The process that the Regiment went through was part of an assessment of all ADF activities to determine whether they should be done only by uniformed personnel, by Defence civilians or by commercial contractors. The implications of the Regiment winning the tender is in fact that Australian mapping will be carried out by Defence civilians at Fortuna.

In effect, this means:

The raising of an organisation that will be known as 'The Army Topographic Support Establishment' that will be collocated but not part of the Army Survey Regiment and will be responsible directly to the Director. It will number about 150 personnel and the equivalent number of positions will be removed from the establishment of the Regiment. This organisation will provide standard mapping support of Mainland Australia to the Australian Defence Force and in addition will provide Aeronautical charting and the printing of Naval charts.

The reduced Army Survey Regiment will remain in place and will provide strategic mapping support to the ADF and in particular, concentrate its efforts on Defence Cooperation Mapping.

There is obviously a lot of work yet to be done, not least of which will be the recruiting of a Manager. Once he or she is installed it will be followed by the filling of the second level and so on. The opportunity will be given to serving members of the Regiment to transfer across the new organisation as each level is recruited.

As you can see, some hard decisions had to be made and some hard talking had to be done but in the end, the Regiment's submission won against all competition and they should be well pleased.

8. General Business.

a. Corps Birthday Function 1994

The meeting was informed that the Committee had discussed this annual function at it's last meeting. It has been decided that the venue this year will be the Gleneagles Function Centre, Karrinyup. b. ANZAC Day Reunion Venue

This year the Association was invited to attend the 13 Field Squadron RAE Dawn Service and return to the Squadron after the Parade for lunch and comradeship. A room was also set aside so that we could hold our AGM. The President expressed concern about the future of the Survey Corps especially now that 2 Topo Survey Troop ARES will be disbanded. This will mean that Western Australia will no longer have close links with the Survey Corps. This has resulted in the Association losing its venue for reunions and meetings, especially on ANZAC Day. Attendances have dwindled over the last couple of years at both the ANZAC Day Parade and the AGM.

Joe Mazzarol expressed concern about the suitability of 13 Field Squadron RAE being a suitable venue for our ANZAC Day reunion. Several members were in support of this opinion however the majority of members at the meeting agreed that for the time being this was the best alternative.

Options discussed at a Committee Meeting included booking a room at a Hotel or using the facilities at the Sergeants Mess. The Hotel was deemed to be unsuitable due to cost and also the noise was a consideration. The Mess was a possibility however there was no suitable location to hold the AGM.

The President suggested that we should evaluate the suitability of this venue.

The next Committee Meeting will discuss this further. Cedric Clutterbuck suggested ANZAC House was suitable for Committee Meetings but doubted that it would be practical to hold our AGM there.

Barry Parker replied that the Association had only received the request for a donation several days prior to the closing date for donations. No donation was given.

e. Survey Corps Memorabilia

Peter Bowen suggested that the Survey Corps heritage from Western Australia may be better off being displayed at the Army Museum situated in Bulwer Street, Perth. Ray Sargeant said that the memorabilia is the property of 2 Topo Survey Troop ARES, except for one item owned by Brian Firns which was to be sent to the Survey Museum at Bonegilla. Eric Clutterbuck explained that certain items that he had loaned to the Army Museum in Perth took a considerable amount of time before being returned. Eric is concerned for any memorabilia that may be left in their custody. This item was referred to the next Committee meeting for further discussion.

There being no further business the Meeting was declared closed at 1352 hrs.

George served in the west from 1956 till 1963 and was promoted from sapper to Lieutenant in that time. He retired from the corp as a Lieutenant Colonel and was honoured with many awards and decorations. He discovered a fresh water lake near the Warburton Ranges in 1961 which bears his name, Lake Gruszka. Condolences were sent to his wife and family from the association.

Upon discharge "Stewie" returned to Kalgoorlie for several years, attending the school of Mines and then decided to go onto the land at Beverly, where he farmed until fairly recently.

A few years back he retired and moved to Perth with his wife.

Old 4 Field was well represented at the funeral. "Stewie" left a wife and three grown up children.

We are all familiar with the valuable input to the Corps by young Sam, the survey assistant. Sam's post army service to the community is outlined below.

After discharge from the army Sam pursued and was successful in obtaining positions in both the Commonwealth and State Public Service. In these positions his skills and exper-

tise helped establish programmes for the betterment of aboriginal and Torres Strait Island people.

In the 70's he was also instrumental in assisting to set up grass roots organisations such as the legal, medical and other services.

He worked proactively within the bureaucratic structure to effect change and created precedents which worked well for his community.

He was a pioneer in many fields. The most notable achievement and one which has impacted on government departments all over Australia, was the establishment of a black welfare unit within the Department of Social Security. This was designed to help the Darwin Aboriginal and Islander evacuees, after cyclone Tracey devastated that city. The model was so successful it was later emulated by both commonwealth and state governments to assist the community to access their services.

Another programme which was Sam's brainchild is the social welfare courses held at the Kangaroo Point TAFE College.

Whilst studying social work at the University of Queensland he lobbied the academic staff and obtained their support for the then "radical scheme"

Dear Madam,

I have received the sad news about the death of your husband, the late Jerzy Gruszka, an outstanding Polish community worker, retired Australian Army officer, decorated with the Commander's Cross of the Polish Republic's Order of Merit and many other Polish and Australian decorations.

I am deeply shocked by this loss. A Man has departed from us who was exceptionally honourable and capable, who rendered so many services to the Polish community in Australia. He committed himself to community work with all his Wisdom and his Heart, not for the purpose of obtaining fame, but to generously serve others - the young people, the senior citizens, those needing help and the whole community. He was a very much respected Citizen of Australia and Her official representatives frequently spoke about this to me. The work and dedication of Colonel Jerzy Gruszka was very highly regarded also in Poland which resulted in the high decoration recently awarded to him.

Personally, it is difficult for me to come to terms with your husband's departure from us. Not only because he belonged to the elite of the most outstanding Poles in Australia. I will miss his calm wisdom, diligence, experience and modesty which enabled him to possess the rare gift of mobilising and uniting people in the pursuit of worthwhile goals. He represented qualities and skills so necessary to us all. I greatly valued His kindness, advice and cooperation.

I doubt the truth of the maxim stating that "there are no irreplaceable people". There is no one who can replace Colonel Jerzy Gruszka. However, one can follow His example - a generous, wise and modest service to others. There is a great need for that. May I be allowed to say that this would have been His last will. Let us fulfil that.

At the personal request of the Ambassador of the Republic of Poland, Dr Agnieszka Morawińska, I would like to pass on to your Family, Friends and the whole Polish community in Adelaide her expressions of sorrow and sympathy. Please accept also my expressions of grief and sympathy.

Let us not forget that Faith, Hope and Love are stronger than sorrow and death. May the Good Lord give the late Jerzy Gruszka the eternal reward of His Presence for his being so generously present here among us ...

GEORGE GRUSZKA

It is with sadness that I report the sudden death of George Gruszka, at the age of 63 years, on Saturday, 20th August, 1994, at the Royal Adelaide Hospital.

He was in hospital at the time undergoing chemotherapy treatment for leukaemia, and his death was unexpected, especially to George Ricketts who had visited him the previous evening.

The funeral was held on Wednesday, 24th August, 1994. On that morning Requiem Mass was held in George's parish church of St. Francis of Assisi, at Newton, conducted by the Rev. Father K. Chwalek and Father Alan Welchman, and attended by an estimated 300-400 mourners, such was the esteem held for George by the community at large, and especially in the Polish community.

The coffin was draped in both the Australian and Polish flags and was borne into the church in procession by the pallbearers, preceded by the officiating priests and flag bearers representing different Polish organisations, followed by family members and a group of young people wearing colourful Polish national dress. The service was spoken mainly in Polish but also in English, and took almost one and a half hours to complete the moving ceremony.

Several eulogies were given by speakers representing groups that George had been involved with, including one by George Ricketts, both as a friend and representing the Royal Australian Survey Corps. I think he summed up very well in conclusion, when he said "George's greatest achievement was his ability to maintain his strong ethnic ties on the one hand and his ability to fit in so well in his adopted country on the other. His humble nature was well known and he got on very well with all he worked with. He was an inspiration to many and will be sadly missed but remembered with affection."

A Guard of Honour was provided by 4 Field Survey Squadron outside the church and also at the cemetery for the cortege. Besides George Ricketts, myself and Joan, also present at the service were Noel Sproles, Tony Stephens, Mick Dempster, WO2 Peter Hammer and Major Peter Demaine.

Later, a large crowd of mourners attended the burial service at the Enfield Memorial Park Cemetery, to pay their last respects to George Gruszka.

The condolences of all Association members are extended to Eva and family in their time of grief.

Dear Mr. Parker,

As you probably know, the New Guinea Survey Section (later to become the 8th Field Survey Section A.I.F.) was one of the smallest army units in the Second World War. For obvious reasons, it was the first survey unit to go on active service in the Pacific War and, in its brief history, the only army unit to serve both on the Kokoda Trail (Owers Corner immortalises one of its lieutenants) and with Kanga Force, which was the longest airborne operation in any theatre of war in the Second World War.

It last paraded as a unit in Port Moresby in November 1943, when it was disbanded, most were drafted to other survey units. Others, myself included, went into aircrew.

Although the 3rd Field Association, from which the 34 'Colac volunteers' were drawn, has done a great job in helping some of us to keep in touch, most have never met for more than half-a-century.


We hope to march again as a unit in the commemorative activities to mark the fiftieth anniversary of the end of the Second World War.

Of the 82 officers and men known to have served with the unit, only 19 have so far been traced. A further 17 are known to have died during or after the war, and 46 are still 'missing'.

We seek your help in trying to locate as many as possible of these, and also the families of those who have passed on.

With your help, we are keen to contact as many as possible. We should also like to hear from the families of old mates who have passed on.



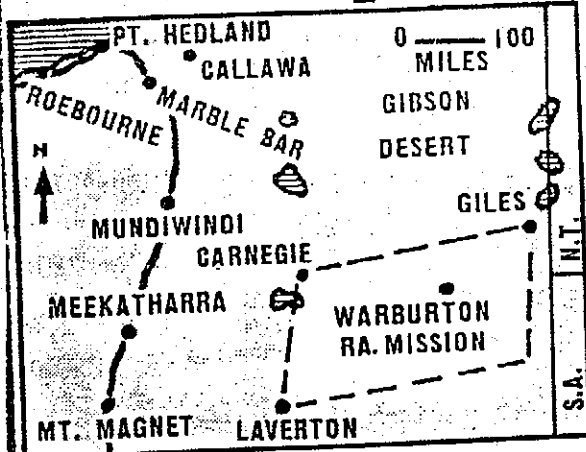

Helicopter, Plane In Army Map Project

TEN thousand gallons of fuel will be used by Army surveyors mapping 60,000 square miles of the Warburton Range area this year.

The mapping task in central WA, fringing the Gibson Desert, to be carried out from June 20 to September 15, will look almost like a combat operation.

A chartered helicopter will be in use for 10 weeks and a Cessna from the Army's new 16th Light Aircraft Squadron for about 12 weeks to cover the great expanse of spinifex plain and desert country.

Western Command surveyors — 18 of them — will be aided by 11 men of 90th Transport Platoon, 11 from 22nd Construction Squadron and three signalmen. The transport platoon will supply the surveyors with 500 gallons of water each week and with fuel, rations and other supplies.

The 10,000 gallons of fuel will be half motor spirit and half aviation fuel.

Outlining the project today, Western Command's Chief Surveyor Major Bill Sprenger said the transport platoon would keep up the supplies, the engineers would renovate an airstrip near Mt. Evered for use on the survey and the three signalmen would maintain long-range radio communications.

Maps produced would replace inadequate maps now used by people in the outback.

Army Men Leave On Big Survey

A team of Army surveyors accompanied by supporting troops left Perth yesterday for central W.A. where it will map 60,000 square miles of territory.

The survey will be near Laverton, Carnegie and the Warburton Ranges, almost reaching the intersection of the Northern Territory and South Australian borders.

The men are travelling in 11 trucks and five Land Rovers. They have a small-wheel bulldozer to renovate the airstrip at Mount Evered.

A helicopter and light aircraft will be used from early next month and it is expected that the operation will be completed by September.

With modern electronic survey methods and the use of aircraft, the cost will be 10/ a mile.

ARMY PROPOSES NAMING ISLAND AFTER NAVY SHIP

Army surveyors are seeking approval from the State Government to name a small island in the Buccaneer Archipelago, off north west Australia, after the Navy vessel supporting their operations.

The island, twelve miles east of Yampi Sound, is now known only by its survey code name of S092, but will be called Advance Island, after IMAS Advance, when negotiations are completed shortly.

For the past six weeks IMAS Advance has been assisting the 79-man Western Command Field Survey Unit carry out the most extensive mapping project of the mainland and off shore islands since the war.

The Army is carrying out its share of a national project to map one and a quarter million square miles of areas over a ten year period.

Operating from the unit's base in Derby, IMAS Advance has made three trips, carrying up to ten surveyors with equipment and supplies, on mapping missions lasting about two weeks.

Their task is to ferry the surveyors to the remote areas and set up supply depots in the islands, some of which are located 250 miles from Derby.

Aviation gasoline is offloaded from IMAS Advance at a number of centralized points for the refuelling of the five Army Sioux helicopters also assisting the mapping project.

As surveys of each of the islands are completed, the Sioux reposition the soldiers on other islands before commencing their major role of accurately establishing heights above sea level using special altimeters.

Meanwhile, the 150-ton Advance with its two officers and fifteen crew members takes over the task of safety vessel for the project, patrolling the area in case it is needed as a search and rescue ship.

Because accurate charts of the reefs and shallow inlets are oft-

en unavailable, stores and equipment are unloaded onto 14 foot fibre glass barges from the patrol vessel for shipment ashore.

The officer commanding the surveyors, Major T.C. (Clem) Sargent, of Fremantle, has high praise for IMAS Advance.

He said that his task of surveying the off-shore islands would have been almost impossible without the help and co-operation provided by the Navy's patrol vessel.

SURVEYORS ON NEW PHASE

A BIG party of WA Army surveyors is preparing for the second and third phases of a six months' survey and mapping expedition of WA.

The survey team, led by Major L. Springer, Officer-in-Charge of Western Command's Field Survey Unit, is part of a nation-wide effort to survey and map all Australia.

The expedition has already taken the surveyors to some of the wildest parts of the State.

The first part of the survey took place in the 120-mile area between Broome and Beagle Bay. Here the group set up control points which form the base for a pattern of systematic surveying. These points will be used by the RAN later this year.

RUGGED STATE SURVEY

A large party of WA Army surveyors will leave Perth this week on a six-month survey and map-making expedition to some of the wildest parts of the State.

Until the end of November, the Army men will live in the coastal scrub and swamps north of Broome, the rugged wilderness of the Warburton Ranges, and the lonely expanse of the Nullarbor Plain.

The survey team, led by Major L. Springer, officer in charge of Western Command's Field Survey Unit, is part of a nationwide effort to survey and map all of Australia.

The party will number 22 men at times.

For support the Navy vessel, HMAS Bass from Darwin will meet the team north of Broome to land them at inaccessible parts of the coast.

As the expedition moves through the Warburton Ranges and desert areas, the surveyors will travel in a convoy of six four-wheel-drive cars, and five 2½ ton trucks.

They will have a helicopter and a Cessna aircraft to help survey work.

Major Springer said at night said the first group of seven surveyors and engineers would leave Perth next Saturday by road for Broome.

Another five men would fly to Broome on Wednesday week.

Two SAS troops to act as boat handlers while surveyors approached remote beaches through the surf would be in the party.

Controls

The men would spend a month in the 120-mile area between Broome and Beagle Bay, setting up control points which form the base for a pattern of systematic surveying.

The control points would also be used by the RAN later this year in a comprehensive programme to chart the North-West coastal waters.

The new system of control points would link with a similar system of stations set up along the West Kimberley coastline in 1960.

Major Springer said at the end of June the expedition would move to the Pallawa area, 140 miles east of Ft. Hedland, for inland survey work.

At the end of July the men would cross to the Warburton Ranges on survey reconnaissance.

Later, they would travel due south to Loongana, on the trans-Australia railway, branching off halfway along the route to survey on a western line to Leonora.

In October another 10 men would join the expedition to make maps of the western parts of the Nullarbor Plain, between Loongana and Norseman.

Last year, the Field Survey Unit mapped 30,000 square miles of the eastern section of the plain.

While the survey teams were in the field, Army map-makers in Perth were constantly turning out detailed maps of sections of WA never thoroughly explored.

Major Springer said the Army was doing the work for the National Mapping Council.

Convoy Paves Way For Maps

An army convoy has left Perth for Laverton to prepare for a 50,000 square mile mapping-survey of desert country in central Western Australia.

The convoy, from 90 Transport Platoon at Karrakatta, comprises 21 men in eight 2½ ton vehicles and two Land-rovers.

They have a mobile cooker and two water trailers. An administrative base is to be established at Laverton. Water, rations and petrol for aircraft and trucks will be stored at the Warburton Range Mission and Carnegie Station.

The supplies are for 11 special air service troops who will leave on November 11 to make a reconnaissance of tracks, airstrips and possible helicopter landing-pads.

Western Command sen-

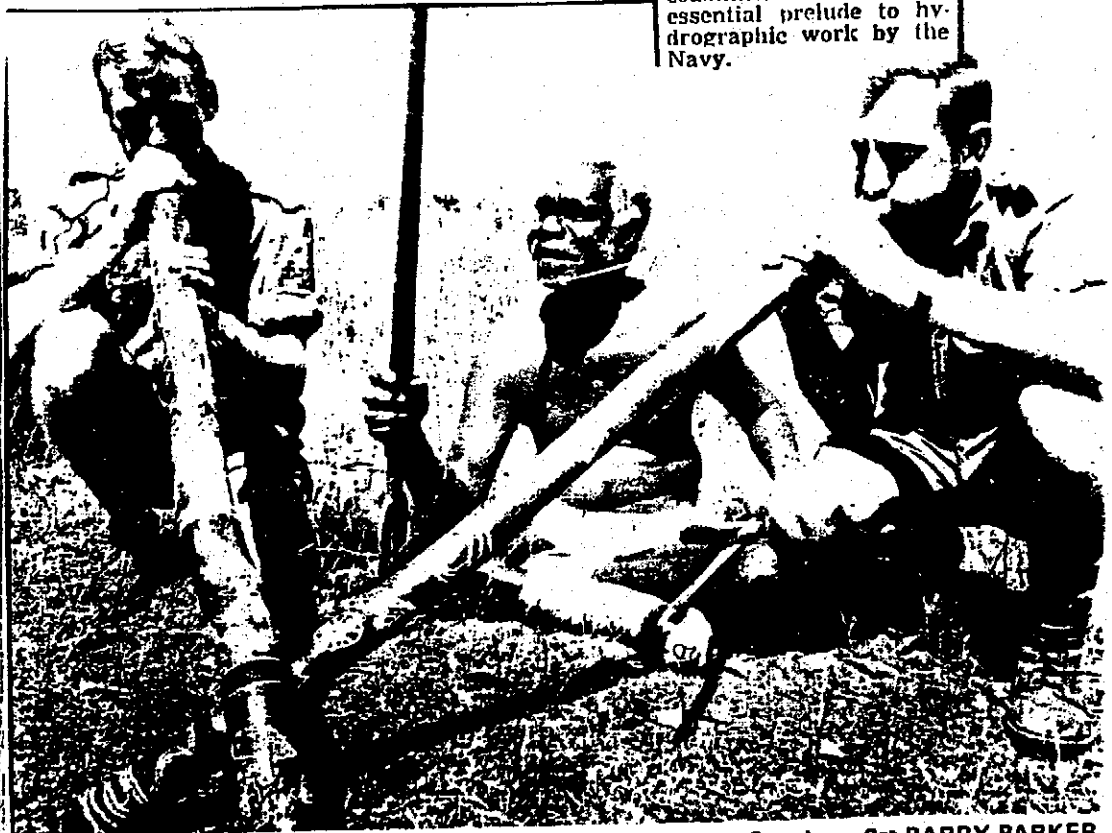
ior transport officer Major D. Wright said yesterday that 90 Transport Platoon would also supply the surveyors in the field next year. On this trip they would be away for six weeks. Their preliminary task in the desert would aid them in their operations next year with the surveyors.

WATER PROBLEM

Much of the area to be covered was without water. Six beer containers filled with water would be placed at strategic points on the trek.

Western Command's chief surveyor Major W. Sprenger, said his surveyors would be aided by helicopters and light aircraft. Army surveyors would also do a geodetic survey from east of Port Hedland to Exmouth Gulf about September next year in conjunction with Lands Department surveyors who would be working from Carnarvon to Onslow.

The work would complete the geodetic survey of the West Australian coastline. This was an essential prelude to hydrographic work by the Navy.
